I am so happy that people buy Big Issue North, it means I have somewhere to live and afford rent.

Tony's training course proves a real life saver

Tony, who sells Big Issue North in Liverpool, tells us about taking part in a new training course and putting his new skills in action!

"It's a course to help people who overdose on drugs through an organisation called Change, Grow, Live. I have been trained to spot if someone has overdosed and, if they have, to inject them with this opiate blocker called Naloxone, which can stop them dying.

"I had to do three training sessions, which included learning about how to administer the injection properly. When people overdose, it's important that you inject them in the right place, you see. It needs to be in arm or the muscle in the top of your leg. If you put it anywhere else it would take a lot longer to work. Now I have a box of the medication at home for when it's needed.

"I thought it would be a good thing to take part in. Quite a few people around here have overdosed recently. There's a car park not far away where they use drugs and it has happened there a few times.

"Having someone nearby who is trained in this can make a big difference because it might be that the ambulance takes 10 or 15 minutes to arrive, by which time it could be too late. This injection can help save someone's life.

"A week ago I administered it for the first time. Someone came knocking on my door because they knew I had done the course. A lad round the corner, who I didn't know, had overdosed.

"You can tell when someone has, because under their eyelids starts going blue, and their lips start going blue and they start shaking.

"When I saw him I knew what was happening and so I used the medication on him. I wasn't frightened of injecting him. When it comes to it, because of what's happening, you just do it. The ambulance arrived 10 minutes later.

"It would be good if more people were trained in this. It would take some weight off the ambulance service. I'm thinking of doing some voluntary work at the drugs service - maybe just one to two days a week or something.

"I say to people, young people, if they are just starting to smoke cannabis... well, they might say it will never lead to doing anything harder but I'd say to them it can, believe you me.

"My doctor and support workers were really made up, and so were the staff at the Big Issue North Liverpool office. They really encouraged me to take this course. They are a good bunch. It's a good old organisation, this."





Liam loving Leeds life

Liam, a vendor who has recently arrived in Leeds from Northern Ireland, tells us how he feels right at home in the city.

"I'm 27. I was backwards and forwards as a child between England and Belfast. "There was a big family break-up when I was a child and I was looking out for myself by the time I was 16. This is the second time selling a street paper, because I sold The Big Issue in the south of England about six years ago. I was heavy on the drugs last time though. I was on

speed, coke, Es, you name it, apart from smack and crack, which I've never touched and never will. I was selling the magazine to support my habit – that's the truth. But I had a wake-up call in 2010, and I went back to Belfast and teetotalled off everything.

"I was working after that. I'm a qualified fork lift driver, and I was working for five years for job employment agencies. But there wasn't always work and I wasn't getting enough money to pay the rent and it got to the stage that my landlord kicked me out. This is just a month ago. I lost everything that I'd worked for for the last five years. I couldn't get any support in Belfast so I decided to come here to Leeds.

"I was hoping to start again here because I thought I could get a better job. I was supposed to get some money from a previous job which would have paid for a deposit on a flat but they messed me about, so I ended up selling Big Issue North. I think the people here in the north are a lot more open. I've had a warmer welcome here in Leeds than I have in any other town. I'm doing well at sales and I've got a few regulars.

"I'm living in a homeless hostel at the moment. The guys in the Leeds Big Issue North office got me in there. I'm hoping to move soon though into my own place.

"I'm going to sell the magazine until after Christmas, and with the money I am earning I'm trying to re-educate myself. The staff in the office are helping me get my CSCS card so I can work on construction sites. I need to concentrate on getting my life back together now. I'm making progress. It's slow but sure. But I'm getting somewhere."

We only sell magazines online the week after they've been published. However, when we have copies of the magazine left over at the end of the week, you can now buy these online if you missed out.


